Course description	Elementary/Intermediate study of classical ballet technique.
	In this course students will learn about the global history and current relevance of classical ballet through research and study of the works of companies, choreographers and dancers from all regions of the world.
	Constant practice of classical ballet technique, improvisation and creation will continue to improve students' technical abilities and further develop their artistry and performance skills, while cultivating a personal style within the classical ballet aesthetic.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
	1-Demonstrate an understanding of the history, impact and relevance of classical ballet worldwide, appreciating the legacy of iconic international dance companies, choreographers and dancers.
	2-Improve posture, coordination, awareness and control of the body.
	3-Demonstrate an Elementary/Intermediate level of understanding of classical ballet technique.
	4-Exhibit an Elementary/Intermediate level of comprehension of ballet terminology both in written and verbal forms.
	5-Understand and exhibit musicality in the use of timing and musical responsiveness.
	6-Demonstrate growth and development of performance skills through the expressive interpretation of set movement vocabulary.
	7-Improve artistry applying newly acquired knowledge of classical ballet technique in the creation and performance of their own choreographic works.
	8-Participate in collaborative and interactive learning experiences.

Assessment components

Assignment 1: Attendance and Participation

Description: Students will be assessed on an ongoing basis in each class. Attendance, commitment and participation in all aspects of the course are fundamental to your progress and artistic growth. Keeping a class journal is recommended to record your observations, document exercises and music selections, and continuously monitor your progress, development, and embodiment of the class material.

Assignment 2: Proficiency and Development

Description: Students will be evaluated on their Elementary/Intermediate technical development throughout the term. Embodiment of the classical ballet aesthetic at the Elementary/Intermediate level will be assessed considering the student's demonstration of secure posture and alignment, coordination, body awareness, musicality, ability to memorize, projection and performance skill.

Weight: 40%

Due Date: Ongoing January 9 – April 12, 2022

Assignment 3: Group Research and Reflection PowerPoint Presentation

Description: Choose an iconic international ballet choreographer or dancer; research and provide career, choreographic and/or performative style details. Reflect and share your thoughts about the relevance and permanence of the works created and/or performed by the artist. Presentations should include images, videos and/or testimonials and must be uploaded to the Research and PowerPoint Presentation Dropbox Folder on D2L.

Workload and responsibilities are to be shared among all the group participants during the research, preparation and presentation of the project.

Maximum 4 participants per group. **Duration:** 15 - 20 minutes per group.

Weight: 5%

Due Date: February 15, 2023

Assignment 4: Choreography and Performance (Final Project)

Assessment Method: In-class presentation

Description: Create a solo or group choreography (1-3 minutes) reflecting your newly acquired musical and rhythmic sensitivity as well as movement versatility and creativity within the ballet dance aesthetic.

Each student is required to perform and individually create a choreography; however, performing in your own choreographic work is not mandatory.

Attendance and Participation Expectations:

FOR GRADED DANCE STUDIO COURSES

A significant part of your grade is based on participation. Participation means not only showing up for class, but also attending to the material at hand with effort and engagement.

With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments.

Thus, more than 3 absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade.

If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class.

If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course.

If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence.

If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, you may not obtain this privilege more than once and you will receive half an absence.

For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and choose to sit for a portion of the class, this will be counted as non-participation and will be marked as half an absence.

Students are responsible for any and all material missed during an absence. If you sustain a significant injury during the term that will impact your participation for longer than a week's worth of classes, your case will be submitted to the Dance

Division Committee to address your situation.
