Sept. 13-Oct. 6, 2016

Technical exercises and improvisations designed to explore the fundamental technical challenges and creative resources of acting

Unit 2 – Monologue Study and Performance

Oct. 11 – Nov. 8, 2016

Analysis, performance and creation centred on the monologue form of dramatic action.

Unit 3 – Creative Collaboration and Performance

Nov. 15 – Dec. 8, 2016

Creation and collaborative exploration and performance of dramatic material in both solo and ensemble formats.

Unit 1 - Scene Study

January 10-February 16th, 2017

Script analysis and performance process applied to a two-person scene

Unit 2 – Actor Legacy Project

Solo performance of chosen research subject

Unit 3 – Physical Ensemble Creation

March 2nd- March 16th

Group dynamics and ensemble creation using Greek Chorus text

Unit 4 - Monologue and Audition Study

March 21st- April 11th

Choosing monologue material and preparation for auditions.

Assessment components

Students will receive handouts with clear details, due dates, assessment criteria and instructions for each major assignment.

There are no formal examinations. Each student will receive a private mid-year and end of year assessment interview with the Instructor.

This is a full year course. Assignments will be shown in class at various stages of development and assessed continuously. The final grade is a combination of the grades from the Fall and Winter terms based on the following components:

FALL SEMESTER:

Assignment 1: Building Blocks for Acting

Sept. 13 – Oct. 6, 2016 **Value**: 25% of Fall Grade

Due Date: Weekly assignments; continuous assessment through studio coaching and

end-of-unit conference

Type: Technical Exercises and Improvisations

Description: Use of improvisation to investigate dramatic action and explore personal

and psychological approaches to the acting of dramatic situations.

There will be weekly solo and duo performance assignments.

<u>Assignment 2</u>: Monologue Study and Performance

Oct. 11 – Nov. 8, 2016 Value: 30% of Fall Grade

Due Date: Oct. 20 and Nov. 8, 2016

Type: Analysis and Performance of Monologue; Creation of Original Monologue

Description: Students will study and perform a monologue from a dramatic text while applying the building blocks explored in Unit 1. Students will also apply their learnings from the study/performance of scripted monologue to the creation of an original monologue of their own devising.

Assignment 3: Creative Collaboration and Performance

Value: 30% of Fall Grade
Due Date: Dec. 6 and Dec. 8

Type: Collaborative Devisement of Original Performance

Description: Drawing on the original material, as well as creative and technical tools, developed in Units 1 and 2, students will collaborate on the creation and performance of original dramatic monologues and scenes.

Fall Assessment of Participation, Growth and Development:

Value: 15% of Fall Grade

Type: Engaged and Reflective Analysis and Self-Assessment

Description: In this portion of the course, creative process takes precedence over immediate result. The degree to which a student commits to process, the degree to which s/he grows during the course of assignments will be given careful consideration in all assessments. Furthermore, since acting is a cooperative art form, the ability to work constructively and supportively with others is an important aspect of creative participation.

At the end of each unit of work, as a component of self-assessment for growth and development, students will be required to write critical reflections on the personal challenges, accomplishments and discoveries experienced in the unit's work.

Winter Assessment of Participation, Growth and Development:

Value: 15% of Winter Grade

Type: Engaged and Reflective Analysis and Self-Assessment

Description: In this portion of the course, creative process takes precedence over immediate result. The degree to which a student commits to process, the degree to which s/he grows during the course of assignments will be given careful consideration in all assessments. Furthermore, since acting is a cooperative art form, the ability to work constructively and supportively with others is an important aspect of creative participation.

At the end of each unit of work, as a component of self-assessment for growth and development, students will be required to write critical reflections on the personal challenges, accomplishments and discoveries experienced in the unit's work. At the end of the year, students will write a reflective overview of the year using the reflections from each unit as reference.
