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| Course description | From the economy to the environment and from politics to entertainment, creativity is an endlessly renewable resource that offers benefits for all citizens and may well be the most important human element for our future. 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| Course learning outcomes | By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: Form an appreciation and understanding of creativity as a genre. Encourage and develop generative thought as a means of creating ideas. Develop an awareness of intuition in the creative process. Play with ideas as a means of developing and realizing creative skills. Encourage the expression of emotions as a way of expressing creative inspirations. Promote a willingness to take risks and make mistakes as the creative process involves many trials and errors before the realization of a creative inspiration. Expand ideas of what constitutes creativity in professional and personal environments. |
