| Assignment 1: Study of Dramatic Tension #1; Written / Presentation         | Students will create a short wordless story of a character engaged in a simple moment which was initiated in the Fall semester. Presentations will happen through the application of mask and will run with an accompanying sound track supplied by the instructor. In addition to the presentation, students will be required to hand in a revised written script of the action, previously worked in the Fall semester – due on the day of presentation, handed in to D2L in a word document attachment. | Assignment 2: Clarity Within Silent Narrative; Presentation/Written        | Working in pairs students will create a short wordless story that involves two characters. Presentations will happen through the application of mask and/or puppetry and will run with an accompanying sound track supplied by the students. In addition to the presentation, students will be required to hand in a written script of the action – due on the day of presentation, handed in by D2L in a word document attachment. The results of this investigation will be presented as part of the International Festival of Animated Objects, in Calgary; this will also be the final presentation day of this material – students are required to be present on Monday March 11, 2024, with a call-time of 5 PM, and completion time of 8:30 PM. Any issues with this requirement must be addressed within the first week of class (accommodations will be made for any conflicts at that time).
