	opening of the body in preparation for voice and acting work, and working towards an			
	increased freedom from habitual, non-functional tension. Assigned projects will inform			
	both artistic and scholarly research. As well, functional stamina and endurance work			
	will be required. There will be an expectation of the student to integrate the work			
	more deeply in all aspects of their craft.

There will periodic assigned questions for journal entries. The final journal paper will be a compilation of the term's discoveries and highlights presented in essay

form. The instructor will collect both the reflection journal and the final paper on the last day of the semester. The journal needs to be kept separately from course notes.
