Prerequisites	<p>None.</p> <p>Notes: Open to all U of C students. Admission based on auditions. The responsibility for cancelling or changing the registration after auditions based on audition results lies with the student.</p>
Course description	<p>MUPF 213: Performing experience in the Symphonic Band. Notes: Not included in GPA.</p> <p>MUPF 313: Performing experience in the Symphonic Band. Notes: May be repeated for credit. Not included in GPA.</p> <p>For the Fall 2020 term, the ensemble will meet online. We will be using the Audacity platform to work together as an ensemble and as chamber musicians. Students will be asked to record their part of different pieces with recordings of ensembles using the multi track technology on Audacity. Students will be asked to record material within their section, playing along with the tracks from the other students and passing it on to the next student via Google Drive in and out of class time. All of the usual requirements of ensemble rehearsal and performance of pitch, timing, tone, etc will be addressed and refined.</p>

Course learning outcomes	<p>By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Play with blend and balance within an ensemble 2. Have mastery of repertoire for all concerts 3. Perform in a variety of styles 4. Use Articulation and dynamics to express musical ideas within an ensemble
Course schedule	<p>The Wind Ensemble will be meeting online for the Fall 2020 term. We will meet via Zoom at the regular class times on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Classes and preparation for classes will consist of;</p> <p><u>Playing</u> Preparation and recording of excerpts from wind ensemble, orchestral and chamber literature. Preparation and recording of individual parts to be mixed and combined to create an ensemble recording. Exploration of Zoom compositions and the use of aleatory and improvisation. In class work will include some work in smaller sections led by the section leaders.</p> <p><u>Listening</u> Examination of wind ensemble, orchestral, and large chamber literature through listening to recordings as a group. Examination of ensemble playing skills through listening to recordings as a group.</p> <p><u>Discussion</u> Strengthening the community created by our shared love of music through discussion of, but not limited to, the following topics; -Ensemble playing skills and their application to different styles and situations (phrasing, musical energy, tension and release, articulations, dynamics, tone quality, etc), -Interpretational differences between performances of varying pieces, -The evolution of Wind Ensemble music, -Role of different instruments within the wind ensemble, -Technology and its role in acoustic music.</p>
Assessment components	<p>Assessment will be based upon your work and progress in the ensemble. You will be expected to fully prepare your music during your own personal practice time outside of class time. For online classes you will be expected to record material using the Audacity platform in and out of class time. You will be expected to participate fully in rehearsals and sectionals. You must be on time for all rehearsals and classes, whether online or in person. This means warmed up and ready to play before the assigned rehearsal/class time. <i>Therefore, each student will be graded based on their participation, punctuality, mastery of their parts, and effort in and out of class time.</i> Unexcused absences, chronic lateness, lack of practice, or poor rehearsal participation will jeopardize successful completion of this course and will be reflected in your final grade.</p>

Guidelines for Zoom Sessions	<p>Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a “live” video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community.</p> <p>To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor’s permission.</p> <p>The use of video conferencing programs relies on participants to act ethically, honestly and with integrity; and in accordance with the principles of fairness, good faith, and respect (as per the Code of Conduct). Students will be advised by their instructor when they are expected to turn on their webcam (for group work, presentations, etc.).</p> <p>Recording Zoom class sessions is at the discretion of the instructor; missing a Zoom class is equivalent to missing an in-person class. The instructor <i>may</i> record online Zoom class sessions for the purposes of supporting student learning in this class – such as making the recording available for review of the session or for students who miss a session – but this is not a requirement. Should an instructor choose to record a class session, students will be advised before the instructor initiates a recording of a Zoom session. These recordings will be used to support student learning only and will not be shared or used for any other purpose.</p>
