Course description	In-depth study of selected composers, their music, and their relationship to intellectual history (i.e. Mozart and the French Revolution), and/or examinations of specific western and non-western musical cultures (i.e. Music in India, Music in post-war Germany) and their impact. Attendance at relevant musical concerts and lectures may be required.
Course overview	Ce cours se situe entre un cours magistral et un séminaire. Durant le semestre, les étudiant(e)s assisteront régulièrement aux cours magistraux. Étant donné le nombre restreint de participants, les étudiant(e)s seront encouragé(e)s à participer activement aux discussions ponctuelles sur des thèmes précis. Les connaissances de base de la musique européenne des XVIIIe, XIXe et XXe siècles seront introduites aux étudiant(e)s. Outre l’information historique, le cours présentera des notions techniques qui permettront aux amateurs d’écouter des œuvres de musique de chambre, symphonique et opératique plus en profondeur. Durant le semestre, les étudiant(e)s seront invité(e)s d’assister à plusieurs concerts. Pour ce cours, la capacité de lire la musique est certainement un avantage, mais elle n’est pas une obligation. Nous examinerons aussi les contextes sociologiques dans lesquels cette musique a évolué. Par ailleurs, les devoirs seront conçus pour renforcer les techniques de recherche et la capacité des étudiant(e)s à communiquer oralement et par écrit. C’est à travers des œuvres de Haydn, Mozart et Beethoven, qualifiées de « romantiques » par E. T. A. Hoffmann au début du XIXe siècle, que la musique instrumentale a finalement supplanté la musique vocale. Ainsi est née l’idée d’un art musical « autonome », d’une « musique absolue » dont la signification n’est plus liée à un texte ou à une fonction sociale spécifique. Dans ce cours nous examinerons la naissance et le développement de ce nouveau concept et l’impact qu’il a eu sur la

	musique classique du XIXe et du début du XXe siècles.
