# Description

Part-writing and analysis with an emphasis on chromatic harmony and modulation in the music of the nineteenth century.

# **Outcomes**

Through creative and analytical exercises, students will gain command of the chromatic materials of tonal music, with an emphasis upon late 18<sup>th</sup> - and 19<sup>th</sup> -century compositions. The vocabulary will include: modulation, mode mixture, Neapolitan chords, augmented-sixth chords, altered dominants, enharmonic relationships, and chromatic and double-chromatic mediant relationships. Students will be able to describe how composers generated large-scale forms (sonata, rondo) with unique characteristics through the use of these materials as well as sophisticated developmental procedures. Students will be able to discuss all of these materials, either orally or in a clearly argued essay. Students will also create a small-scale composition using chromatic materials.

# Listening

A complete understanding in any music course can only be accomplished through careful listening. Because listening requires awareness, attention and memory, **laptops or any other electronic devices** are **not allowed** in class.

# **Assignments**

Students will hand in assignments to the instructor in class on the due date announced in class or prior to 4:00 pm on that same day to the Reception Desk at the office of the School of Creative and Performing Arts (CH D100). All assignments will be graded under the following conditions:

Submitted early (prior to 4:00pm on the day before the due date)- as marked **plus** half a grade point (eg. B to B+)

Submitted on time - as marked

Submitted late by one week or less - as marked **minus** a grade point

(eg. B+ to C+)

No assignments will be accepted after one week. Extensions will be granted for compellingly valid reasons (such as illness, etc). Contact the instructor in advance of the deadline.

All assignments and tests will be marked according to the following criteria: accuracy, clarity and musicality. All exercises will require students to exercise musical judgment, based upon analytical evidence, and some will require students to use musical materials in a creative manner.

# Fluency

Students will complete tests designed to ensure that they have a comprehensive knowledge of the vocabulary studied in the course. Fluency includes the ability to rapidly identify or generate harmonic structures, harmonic relationships, dissonance, and tendency-tones. It also includes the ability to rapidly solve short part-writing challenges. Time will always be a factor with these tests.

# Plagiarism

Students are encouraged to discuss assignments with their colleagues with the aim of fully understanding the materials in the course. However, in the event that two or more students submit the same solutions to all of the questions on an assignment (where it is obvious that one person must have copied from another), the papers will all receive the grade of F and a warning. A repeat will be considered a contravention of the University's policy regarding Academic Integrity.

# **Analysis Paper**

Topic to be announced in class. Students will generate a three-page essay (with additional pages for musical examples and diagrams) that takes an analytic point of view on the assigned music. In order to obtain a passing grade, the prose must be clear and comprehensible. Spelling and grammatical errors will negatively affect the grade. The paper will be written using a 12 pt Times or equivalent font and a 1.5 line space.

## Composition

Two-minute (maximum) duet for a solo instrument and piano. If the solo instrument is voice, the part will be sung on an appropriate vowel (vocable). If the solo instrument is percussion, then it must be a keyboard percussion instrument. The composition will use the materials of the course in a manner described by the instructor in class. Students will receive a grade of A for this component of the course if they complete all of the following: submit a computer-realized score on the day of performance; have the piece performed in class; and, attend both of the classes when all of the compositions are performed. Failure to complete all three of these requirements will result in a grade of F.
