Course description	This course will explore the various overlapping and contradictory concepts of musical
	modernity that emerged during the late 19th and early 20th centuries and how these
	concepts ramified to create the extraordinarily heterogeneous situation we know
	today. It uses an inquiry-based learning approach. It will examine how the musical
	revolutions associated with twentieth-century music grew out of the late nineteenth-
	century European art music tradition and eventually spread over the world. Students
	will be exposed to representative examples of this music, as well as the cultural and
	social contexts that gave it meaning. The course is also intended to expand and refine
	students' bibliographic literacy and research abilities, as well as enhance their
	communication skills.
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
outcomes	1. better understand developments in the music related to the nineteenth-century art
	music tradition;
	2. find information pertinent to research and artistic activity more efficiently;
	3. critically assess the value of this information;
	4. better communicate this information in language appropriate to academic
	institutions.
Course schedule	The course will be divided in two halves. The first half (beginning to reading week) will
	focus on music of the first half of the twentieth century. The second half (reading week
	to the end) will focus on music of the second half of the twentieth century.
Assessment	The course requirements are a term paper on the theme of 'musical borrowing and
components	influence', a concert review of contemporary music, a midterm test and a final exam.
	Assignment 1: Term paper
	Value: (proposal and bibliography 10% + term paper 30%) = 40%
	Due dates: Proposal and bibliography Friday 26 Jan.; Term paper Friday 6 April
	Type: written text
	Description: The term paper project theme is 'musical borrowing and influence.'

Choose a work or group of works by a composer born on or after 1910) whose music allows you to explore this theme. This assignment has two components:

- a. Each student will present an 800-word proposal of the specific topic s/he has chosen for the term paper. The summary will begin with a title page containing a provisional working title, student name and ID number. The text will include a brief description of the composer and works to be examined, as well as a concise presentation of the issues/questions/problematic that will be dealt with in the course of the final term paper. The proposal will be accompanied by an annotated bibliography containing at least twelve sources, pertaining specifically to your topic. The annotated bibliography should present a balanced selection of sources (both primary and secondary), providing information on the composer, his/her works and how they relate to the term paper topic. The bibliography may contain no more than two stand-alone web sites. You may cite the Auner and Grout textbooks, but they will not count among the twelve sources. The proposal and the bibliography must be presented using standard bibliographic form (see Music in Words: A Guide to Researching and Writing about Music or the Chicago Manual of Style, 16th edition).
- b. The completed term paper should cover ca. 4000/5000 words) and deal appropriately with the issues/problems/questions presented in the introduction.

Description: Write a concise review (ca. 1000 words) on one of the two Forms in Sound
