Course Description:

The course is devoted to the practical study of polyphony, including species (modal) counterpoint but focusing upon eighteenth century (tonal) counterpoint. Through creative exercises and analysis, students will study the technique of tonal counterpoint, with an emphasis upon the approaches found in eighteenth-century music. This will include the study of melodic line, non-imitative and imitative counterpoint including canon, and invertible counterpoint. Students will be introduced to the principles of species counterpoint and linear progressions.

Learning Outcomes:

By the completion of the course, successful students will be able to: analyze the formal and technical elements of two-part eighteenth century compositions; make creative use of the materials studied in the course (dance form movement & invention); have an introductory understanding of three-part contrapuntal technique.
