Description

Advanced creative and analytic approaches to the study of selected repertoire with an emphasis upon contemporary music.

Outcomes

Focussing on contemporary Canadian repertoire and through selected readings, analysis, and creative exercises, this course will explore the role of pitch and timbre in the generation of contemporary musical forms as well as the role of new approaches to rhythm (micro-, meso- and macro) in the control of the flow of musical time.

Through seminar presentations and critical dialogue, students will develop an advanced vocabulary for dealing with the structural and aesthetic issues inherent in contemporary music.

The principal resource for scores and recordings is the Canadian Music Centre (Taylor Family Digital Library – 3rd Floor) or **musiccentre.ca**

All readings will be web-based or excerpts provided by the instructor.

- Approved topic, due date for proposal (one paragraph abstract) November 2
- Fifteen page maximum analytic/critical paper (including musical examples and bibliography/footnotes, 12 pt. font, default 1.5 line spacing)
- The quality of the prose will affect the quality of the argument and therefore the quality of the grade.
