	performance practice may be offered. Consult the timetable for current topic.

Course Overview	The purpose of this course is to introduce graduate students to the music of György
	Ligeti and the different contexts within which it was composed. We will examine
	representative compositions from the different phases of his career and explore the
	impact that time and place had on his work.
	The course will be held in a seminar format, allowing participants the opportunity to
	discuss and critically assess problems and issues concerning music scholarship and
	research techniques.
Course Learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
Outcomes	1. better understand the music of one of the most significant composers of the late
	twentieth century;
	2. better understand the impact that culture and a sense of place can have on the
	composition of art music;
	3. conduct research and communicate outcomes more efficiently.
Course Schedule:	On 1 October students of the seminar will be invited to attend the inaugural sessions
	of the Symposium: 'John Roberts, the CBC and music in Canada'.
	On 8 October the seminar will be cancelled because Dr. Sallis will be attending a
	conference in Paris.
	On 26 November, part of the session will be devoted to a presentation by Dr. Joy
	Calico (Vanderbilt University), who will discuss the post-World War II reception of the
	music of Schoenberg's Viennese School.
	Course content will focus on the acquisition of skills necessary to conduct research and
	to prepare reports. During September, students will choose the object of study for
	their main research project (book review or analysis). During October, students will
	prepare and present a review of a text (article or book chapter). November and
	December will be devoted to the preparation and delivery of final reports. For more
	detailed information, see the seminar syllabus.

Assessment Components

Assignment 1: Book review/analysis project. Students will choose to prepare either a review of a recent book on Ligeti and his music or analyze an important work by the composer. The object of study must be approved by Dr. Sallis. This assignment will be done in three stages:

1a: Annotated bibliography

Value: 20%

Due Date: 24 September

Type: written text

Description: Prepare a proposal (ca. two pages) for a book review or a musical analysis. The proposal should explain why you have chosen your object of study and be accompanied by a bibliography, i.e. a representative and balanced list of at least 15 sources (no more than 4 stand-alone websites) that provide information pertinent to your proposed project. The list should include primary source material (published texts, public comments made by the composer, interviews, etc.) and secondary sources (critiques and academic discussion of the composer and his or her music), as well as sources discussing the contexts within which Ligeti's work circulated. The bibliography must be structured according to rules set out in The Chicago Manual of Style (15th or later edition).

1b: Update on the project

Value: 10%

Due date: 5 November **Type:** Oral report

Description: Each student will present a brief oral report (ca. 5/10 minutes followed by discussion) on the state of his or her project, accompanied by a one page summary.

1c: Final report

Value: 10% (oral presentation) + 30% (written report) = 40%

Due Date: 26 November & 3 December (depending on the number of registered

students)

Type: oral presentation and written report

Description: Prepare a report (ca. 2500 words) on the outcome of your project. The written report should be accompanied by your final bibliography and will serve as the basis for the oral presentation (ca. 15 minutes followed by discussion).

Assignment 2: Chapter/article review

Value: 20%

Due date: 15 & 22 October December (depending on the number of registered

students)

Type: Oral report accompanied by a written summary (ca. three pages)

Description: Each student will choose a text on Ligeti (an article or book chapter) and prepare an oral presentation (ca. 15 minutes followed by discussion) and accompanied

by a written summary.

Assignment 4: Seminar participation

Value: 10%

Date: Throughout the semester

Assessment **Expectations**

Expectations for Writing:

All written and oral presentations will be evaluated in terms of content, form and language competency.

Expectations for Attendance and Participation:

All students are expected to attend the seminar regularly and participate actively in discussions.
