Course Description	Introductory study of Contemporary Dance techniques.  NOT INCLUDED IN GPA.  This course uses an inquiry-based learning approach.
	Inquiry-based learning is both a philosophy and a methodology In its simplest sense, inquiry-
	based learning is a question-driven search for understanding and a collaborative experience. It is a process where the instructor helps learners to formulate relevant and worthwhile questions, hypothesize solutions, search and critically analyze information. Through this process students construct meaningful information structures, design, apply and effectively communicate solutions in a way that demonstrates evidence of new understandings and ways of thinking. 	To gain better kinesthetic awareness and knowledge of your own body. To improve stamina, agility, and balance. To learn to locomote the body through space efficiently. To develop an appreciation for the art form of Contemporary Dance. To develop foundational skills that will serve as a basis for further study.

## Course Activities and Content

In this course, we will explore the moving body in relationship to time, space, and energy. Each meeting will consist of a technique class where we will explore the diverse movement and training techniques associated with Contemporary Dance. We will also engage in a workshop like atmosphere exploring related topics, giving a context to our technique class material. You are expected to engage with the material from a positive and curious place.

We will focus on moving, thinking and feeling. Often the mind, body and soul are assumed to be separate entities. This dualism, the division of the movement and the mover, can lead us to a place of misunderstanding when dealing with an art form that requires the body, mind and soul to be united in a seamless relationship. The body is our instrument. It is epistemological; a thinking, moving, and sensing organism.

In DNCE 201, you are encouraged to explore movement material deeply. We will work on sensing the body to develop a more refined awareness of body parts and joints, and the relationship between them. This will give us the foundation for developing an articulate and expressive body.

## Assessment

This is a Pass/Fail course.

To achieve a passing grade you must complete all the requirements listed below.

Requirements:

Attend and participate in class. Explore all material deeply and intelligently, and join discussions expressing your understanding of the ideas and concepts presented in class.

FULL participation is required through the entire class time; you must arrive on time, dressed to dance, having reviewed previous class material. Your preparation for class work should include a program of stretching and strengthening and a pre-class warm up.

Non-participation through any part of class be assessed as ½ an absence (this includes late arrivals or early departures); i.e. 2 such classes are equivalent to a full absence. 4 missed classes will result in a failing grade.

Dance Journal: You are expected to keep a dance log/journal. This is a daily informal written assignment designed to inspire a mental dialogue with the movement material. You are expected to identify your strengths, weaknesses, and strategies for success. This is also a useful tool for keeping track of class material. It will aid you in your Mid-term and Final Choreographies.

Assignment #1 See the Dance Department's *Professional Series*, January 23-25 8pm at the University Theatre. Participate in a class discussion of the show. The class will be divided into small groups. Each group will propose a discussion topic to lead the class in a discussion. Each group will submit a paragraph detailing the discussion topic one class prior to the discussion. Participation beyond your own groups topic is expected.

Assignment #2 See *Mainstage Dance*, March 20-22 8pm at the University Theatre. Participate in a class discussion of the show. The class will be divided into small groups. Each group will propose a discussion topic to lead the class in a discussion. Each group will submit a paragraph detailing the discussion topic one class prior to the discussion. Participation beyond your own groups topic is expected.

Mid-term: Create a 1 minute Contemporary Dance solo.

Final: Create a 2-4 minute Contemporary Dance solo/ duet/ trio.

I will communicate due dates and further detail in assignments through Blackboard.
