	to delve into the historical roots of West African dance, examining its cultural
	significance and connection to indigenous practices.
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	* West African Traditional Dances:
	* Investigate the intricacies of Yoruba traditional dances, understanding their symbolic meanings, cultural contexts, and spiritual dimensions.
	* Analyze the influence of Yoruba dances on global dance forms and their resonance in different regions.
	* Yanvalou:
	* Examine the enchanting Yanvalou dance, tracing its origins and cultural associations in the Caribbean, particularly in Haitian Vodou rituals.
	* Explore the rhythmic patterns, movements, and cultural expressions embedded in Yanvalou.
	* Global Impact:
	* Investigate how West African and African dances have transcended geographical boundaries, influencing dance forms worldwide to a joyful experience.

- * Identify the ways in which these dances have been embraced and adapted in different cultural contexts.
- * Ritual and Religious Connections:
- * Explore the profound connection between traditional African dances, particularly those of the Yoruba people, and ritual or religious practices.
- * Examine how dance is intricately woven into the worship of Orishas, unraveling the spiritual dimensions of movement.
- * Comparative Analysis:
- * Contrast and compare variations of traditional dances across different regions, understanding how names and styles evolve while preserving their essence.

Course learning outcomes

By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- 1. Engage in kinetic explorations, allowing students to embody the movements of Yoruba traditional dances and Yanvalou, fostering a deeper understanding of the dance vocabulary.
- 2. To know of the different traditional rhythms and purposes.
- Develop intellectual and technical skills, to recognize and understand various types of African dances, fostering a holistic comprehension of the deep correlation between music and movement. Movement initiations and signicants.
- 4. To learn of the history and understand the reason for moments.
- 5. To improve coordination while exploring a different way of movement.
- Recognize the importance of improvisation as a key element in the creative process, allowing for the development of personal style within the African dance aesthetic.
- 7. Acquire a thorough understanding of the Yoruba traditional dances, including their symbolism and cultural context.
- 8. Identify and analyze the influence of West African/African dance forms, recognizing the impact and diverse traditions.
- Foster an appreciation for cross-cultural connections and influences.
 Acknowledging how African dance traditions have enriched and been enriched by global dance dialogues.
- 10. Effectively communicate insights and analyses related to West African/African dance orally, written and movement forms.
