Course description	The special topic is jazz dance creation and a focus on developing choreographic
	structures that support clear artistic goals, with an emphasis on the essential
	philosophies of authentic jazz dance and philosophies that guide contemporary
	jazz culture.
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Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
	1. appreciate a practice rooted in ancestral veneration and expression of the human spirit
	2. discover the ways in which jazz discourse and connects to the critical, political, moral, and aesthetic dimensions of contemporary society
	3. learn from the rich and generative set of experiences related to jazz creation and verbalize the essential Africanist aesthetics
	4. express in words and movement the importance of the phenomenon of social dancing and improvisation through an embodied/explorative and rooted jazz dance practice, and to reflect on the world and one's place in it
	5. create and manipulate jazz-based movement to develop vocabulary at an intermediate level
	6. recognize and implement compositional structures, themes and arcs
	7. set up relationships between bodies and ideas to create meaning
	8. Understand and explore at a basic level how to supplement a choreographic work with music, props, or other signifiers
	9. Discover how athletic conditioning (i.e., warm-up and cool-down), somatic practices (i.e., kinaesthetic awareness, movement efficiency, breath pattern and safe dance practices such as risk identification, injury prevention, and injury management) can assist preparing the mind-body system for creation
Course schedule	Monday - Saturday: the professor will start the day by leading a discussion and
	then provide an opportunity for student-oriented small group discussion. This will be followed by a 15-minute self-guided pre-warm-up at the beginning of the day. The morning will continue with class, improvisational structures or/and set exercises. The lunch and afternoons will be dedicated to practicing skills related to the choreographic theme of the day and creation movement studies. The movement study will be performed at the end of the day.
	Saturday afternoon: The professor will lead a 30- minute warm-up after short lunch. The remainder of the day will be dedicated to performing a 4 -minute final
	assignment, bringing together knowledge and skills gained throughout the week.
Assessment components	1. Quality of Student Engagement
	Description: Due to the experiential nature of this course, a significant part of the grade will be based on student ongagement. In addition to participation in
	the grade will be based on student engagement. In addition to participation in compositional assignments, students are expected to read any distributed
	articles outside of class and be prepared to discuss them in class (20%). They
	are expected to provide constructive criticism during feedback sessions on their peers' work (10%).

	Description: Student-developed glossary of terms related to jazz dance, music
	and culture. This assignment will be discussed in class and posted on the D2L.

	3. Final Rough Draft Project:
	Description: Preparation and presentation of a final project, which develops
	out of the intensive week—a collaborative jazz composition. The students must
	demonstrate that their piece is ready for performance in its rough state, a
	jumping off place for future refinement. The work is NOT expected to be
	deeply explored, expertly fleshed out, or polished. The work should have
	enough content, shape and meaning for peer audience to engage in
	conversation and feedback. Group individuals will all express and comment on
	imagined choreographic revisioning, refining and clarifying meaning. The work
	should aim to be personal, innovative, and iconoclastic and align with the spirit
	of jazz culture and contemporary societal issues.

	Description: 200-word piece description, along with 750-word reflection on
	insight gained by the student throughout their process.
