Course Description	Continuing focus on developing choreographic structures that support clear artistic statements, with an emphasis on the duet form.
Course Overview	This is a creation-based course with a strong emphasis on the duet form, also briefly further investigating the solo form and introducing the trio form. Through this course, the student will work in small groups to experiment with choreographic composition, performance and direction, and will further practice observing dances, articulating what she sees and providing constructive feedback.
Course Learning Outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Create and manipulate movement; 2. Understand and use space efficiently; 3. Implement form and structure; 4. Create meaning; 5. Establish a compositional arc; 6. Set up relationships between bodies and between ideas; 7. Integrate interdisciplinary influences to their compositions; 8. Direct dancers responsibly; 9. Plan and schedule rehearsals; 10. Receive, apply and provide constructive feedback.

<p>Course Schedule:</p>	<p>Through creative assignments, the students will practice their compositional skills by revisiting the solo form (1 assignment), exploring the duet form in depth (3 assignments), and by being introduced to the trio form (1 assignment). Through in-class discussions following exercises of doing and viewing, as well as through written responses to assigned readings and viewing of live work between classes, the students will develop the skills to formulate critical responses to choreographic and choreography-related materials.</p> <p>Class work will involve the identification and development of the skills students require to fulfill the assignments. Students will be required to practice these skills with their dancers in rehearsals between classes and to bring movement materials to each class for discussion and further work. Students will therefore be expected to establish a creation/ rehearsal schedule and source out a suitable space for their practice work between classes.</p> <p>The students are REQUIRED to bring a course-dedicated NOTEBOOK to EACH class for note-taking and journaling purposes. The notebooks will be collected periodically throughout the term to help with the assessment of participation and progress.</p>

<p>Assessment Expectations</p>	<p><u>Expectations for Writing:</u> Writing skills are essential to a successful career in dance– whether it is to compose a press release, a grant application or an email to a prospective employer– and/or to develop and maintain a healthy career in any other field. Therefore it is important to develop these skills early and in parallel to physical, artistic and analytical training. Additionally to content, clarity, concision and articulation will be taken into consideration when assessing the student’s writing.</p> <p>Writing skills are important to academic study across all disciplines. Consequently, instructors may use their assessment of writing quality as a factor in the evaluation of student work. Please refer to the Undergraduate Calendar E.2 Writing Across the Curriculum policy for details.</p>

Expectations for Attendance and Participation:

Due to the experiential nature of the course, assignments are often built-into classes. Therefore, classes missed will be detrimental to the final grade. An injury or illness lasting 2 or more weeks that prevents you from participating in class may require a medical withdrawal from the course.

Guidelines for Formatting Assignments

Given the assignments' varying nature for this course, guidelines for formatting will be discussed in class and posted on the D2L.

Written assignments should be formatted with 1-inch margins, 12-point font, double-spaced, using Times New Roman font.

Guidelines for Submitting Assignments

Written assignments are to be submitted in hard copy at the beginning of class on a given deadline. Dance composition assignments are to be ready for showing at the beginning of class on a given deadline.

Late Assignments

Late written assignments will be penalized by 10% per day past a given deadline. Penalty for late composition assignments will be discussed with the course instructor on a case-by-case basis.

Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass

To reach the passing grade, the student must complete all assignments, and participate in all class activities with respect for their peers, instructor and own practice. This involves making an effort to keep an open mind and demonstrating satisfactory progress in their understanding and application of the course's material over the length of the term.
