Prerequisites	There are no prerequisites for this class and students from every discipline are welcome. NOTE: Drama majors and minors may not count this course towards their field requirements. (Formerly Fine Arts 205).
Course Description	An exploration of the elements of story present in the arts and beyond. Story is an exciting, creative, dynamic and universal form of human expression with the potential to engage and inspire students from across departments and disciplines.
Course Overview	Stories form a foundational component of culture. Evidence shows that every society creates an identity through some type and form of narrative practice. Both individually and collectively, our humanity is built upon storytelling. This course interrogates the ways and means by which we come to know ourselves as a people and as a community through the art of story. We will interrogate the practice of storytelling as a device that both informs and shapes us individually and collectively. This course considers story as an act of expression conveyed used through a variety of disciplines such as music, drama, dance, and the visual arts.
	Warning: We will explore a diverse plethora of stories. Some of these narratives will be engaging, enlightening and delightful in nature but some will be disturbing, violent or sexually explicit. We will have candid and open discussions about all of these topics. Interrogating the full width and breadth of story is an integral component of the course design. Please note that these sensitive topics can be instructive and useful but also difficult and challenging.
