Prerequisites	Anterequisite(s): Not open to Drama majors or minors.
Course description	An exploration of the elements of story present in the arts and beyond. Story is an exciting, creative, dynamic and universal form of human expression with the potential to engage and inspire students from across departments and disciplines.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Define story as a concept, and in terms of its functions; 2. Identify use-cases for story in creative and practical work; 3. Illustrate contribution(s) of story in different contexts; 4. Construct basic stories for use in projects.
Course schedule	Materials relevant to each week's work are posted to D2L. Questions / comments arising outside class time will be answered in class at the start of each session. In the first half of the semester, we explore the definition of story and its uses in different cases. In the second half, we turn to practical uses of story in different contexts. Students will share their knowledge in four assignments during the term: two short research papers and two in-class quizzes.
