	DRAM 312 focuses on how to approach Shakespearean text for the actor. Using	
	the structures that are built into the text and how to apply them to the work of	
	the actor [not as a literary device]. This is the art of persuasion and all the	
	elements, though specifically for this style of text, can be applied to text from any	
	period. It is an extension of the work of DRAM 309, applying impulse to works of	
	larger ideas and arguments.	
	Use of Digital Theatre+ is highly recommended for this course, as there are	
	numerous productions of Shakespeare's plays available to help you hear the text

Reflect on your takeaways from his journey, what inspires you from his process and the impressions you have of an actor's life. Discuss your own process up to this point and how it has grown and evolved over the course of your degree. #### **Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:**

### Missed or Late Assignments:

DRAM 312 is an experiential course and attendance is mandatory. Students must be in the space and prepared to begin at the scheduled start of class. Arriving as the class is beginning is unacceptable. The work is collaborative in nature and respect for everyone in the space is required.

#### Attendance and Participation Expectations:

### Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass

This is the minimum to pass but students are encouraged to challenge themselves to go beyond the minimum, to discover the full potential in the work.

Expectations regarding grading are as follows:

- o A student who shows up, does the minimum amount of work and manages to show signs of progress will receive a grade in the neighborhood of a C.
- o A student who participates actively, is curious about the process and applies the work diligently will receive a grade in the neighborhood of a B.

 A student who really takes on the work, challenges themselves and the group to move forward and goes well beyond the minimum of requirements, will receive a grade in the neighborhood of an A.
