Course learning outcomes	 By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: Identify and articulate upon significant theatrical movements in the history of Canadian Theatre. Critically engage with plays and their context within Canadian society. Seek out and engage with plays by Canadian playwrights. Research and form an argument for research-based papers.

Assessment components	Class Participation: Weight: 15% Description: Participation in class play readings and discussions. Students are expected to come to class having read the entirety of each play being studied and thoughtfully engage in the class discussion.
	Assignment 1: Assessment Method: Research Paper Weight: 30% Due Date: March 19 Description: 1,500 word research-based paper on any topic relating to Canadian theatre. Topics are to be discussed with the instructor or TA prior to Reading Break.
	Assignment 2: Assessment Method: Presentation Weight: 10% Due Date: April 9 Description: Students will research and present on two theatre companies in Canada that focus on the creation of new Canadian plays. At least one should have a focus on theatre that amplifies the voices of marginalized communities.
	Quizzes Weight: Three quizzes worth 15% each Dates: February 1, March 12, April 4 Description: During class time on D2L. Multiple choice and short answer questions. Not cumulative.
