Out of Class Activities	Students will be required to attend two theatre productions outside of the University. One per semester.
Prerequisites	Antirequisite(s): Not open to students with credit in Drama 366.
Course Description	Explorations in personal/group creative process; facilitation of performance forms that may include sound and movement exploration, storytelling, ritual, mask, puppetry, and the collaborative creation of original performance. Theory and history of performance creation is integrated with practical experience. Notes: Required for combined BFA (Drama Education)/BEd.
Course Overview	DRAMA 360 is an introductory level course that investigates interdisciplinary aspects of dramatic process and performance. Through lectures, workshops and practical work—solo, group and collaborative projects—students will experientially participate in developing embodied techniques for creating and exhibiting different performance models.
Course Learning Outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will have an understanding of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Investigating performance: Through discussion, readings, films and in-studio practical work, students will develop a foundational understanding of the creative process and performance. • Inspiration and development: Starting from initial emotional responses through to final presentations, students will explore, experiment and document a personal development process. • Creation: Students will participate in and develop several creation projects, ranging from personal narratives, mini-theatre, site-specific performances and collaborative group work. • Collaboration: Students will learn team-based leadership skills and techniques relating to the successful creation and development of group projects.
Course Schedule:	Solo Activities: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • (Sept 22) Process of Characterization – fall semester – (Not Marked): Develop a character based on a piece of music that inspires you, and create an object that represents that character. • (Oct 27/29) Personal Narrative - fall semester (5%): Create and perform a solo piece of theatre between 3-5 minutes including staging and design, inspired by a real personal experience. • (April 8/12) Final Solo Project – winter semester (20%): Students will finish the year by returning to solo work and creating a 5 minute piece using the skills acquired throughout the year on a topic chosen by the Instructor.

	<p>Group Activities:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • (Dec 8) Mini-Theatre - fall semester (10%): In small groups, students will work together to re-create a 3-5-minute scene from a play chosen by the Instructor. This scene will be presented using small puppets, cut-outs, projections or body parts within a created 'set'. The presentations will be projected live onto a screen in the classroom. • (Feb 25) Site-Specific Performance - winter semester (15%): In small groups, students will create and develop a 7-minute site-specific performance (on campus). Students will be responsible for all aspects of the performance, including permission to use their intended performance space. <p>Papers/Written:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Idea Book (10%): handed in at the end of each semester. • (Nov 5 and Mar 3) Performance Essay (5% each: Total 10%): Students will submit a written critique on two separate, locally produced performances (one per semester) Not University shows – referencing lecture topics, theories and practical experience from the studio work. • Process Journals (10%): Students will write a process report on each activity, addressing the question of "How did I get here from there?"

<p>Assessment Expectations</p>	<p>Growth: Demonstrates successful application of concepts and skills learned during in-class exercises, as well as the student's initiative, their commitment to the work, their willingness to take risks, and their ability to receive and to integrate criticism into successive class activities.</p> <p>Participation: Demonstrates punctual attendance, interest in the work, concentration, focus and commitment to class and group projects, preparation, and an overall positive contribution to class discussions and activities.</p> <p>A documented illness or family emergency is an acceptable reason for late written work or inability to make scheduled presentations. In the case of a missed oral presentation or class participation assignment, the instructor would appreciate advance notification if possible. "Documented" means a fully explanatory note from an appropriate authority, e.g., physician or counselor.</p> <p>Late written assignments with no documented excuse will be accepted with the penalty of three points deducted from the final mark for EACH DAY or portion thereof past the deadline.</p>

	<p>** Attendance and participation in all classes is <i>mandatory</i>. Failure to attend classes and rehearsals may result in academic penalty unless excused by medical certificate or equivalent justification.</p> <p>As an experientially based studio course, in most cases it will not be possible to make up missed classes or presentations. As well, student progress depends on interaction and participation of peers to a greater degree than in a standard lecture-based course. The absence of one student may negatively impact several others. The theatre is a collaborative art rather than a solo flight, requiring that participants work together. Please honour this tradition of theatre ethics within this class.</p>
