Course description	Further studies in the investigation of acting and live theatrical performance: introductions into the ensemble building and performance exercises of Tadashi Suzuki, exploration into the application of naturalism in performance with an emphasis on partnered-scene-work and monologues.		
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:		
outcomes	1. Invest in physical and vocal articulation warm ups necessary to accomplish the performance needs of naturalistic theatre.		
	2. Demonstrate a basic understanding of the relevance of abstract exploration to the practical task of acting – in this case connected to the modalities of Japanese director Tadashi Suzuki.		
	3. Have a clear process to break down and analyze a given script or text to assist actors in the development of a character, it's needs, objectives and intentions.		
	4. Develop the level of focus and concentration required in formal rehearsal processes.5. Practice rehearsal etiquette.		
	6. Develop an observant eye with regard to strengths and weaknesses in performing actors.		
	 Develop the work ethic needed to succeed as an actor in live performance. Understand the relationships between games and the playing of games with that performance and acting. 		
Course schedule	Unit 1 : Introduction to the modalities of Tadashi Suzuki: this unit will address effective posture and presence on stage while also identifying the individual's place within an ensemble, and creating an individual out of the ensemble. Students will also engage in an investigation of games and how these activities relate directly to the investment of acting – on going through out entire course. This component of the class will also address elements of physical and vocal warm-ups as well as the relevance of game and performance.		

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	 Unit 2: Introduction to naturalism in theatre and acting styles connected to this era of performance – working from the text Woyzeck students will be assigned partner scenes – see below for assessment and assignments. Unit 3: Monologue and character analysis – students select a monologue from a text connected to the naturalist movement, prep with a full character analysis and present in class – see below for assessment and assignments. Unit 4: Continued investigation in naturalism working from the text Miss Julie – note: a second text may be added to accommodate partnering – students will be assigned partners, partners then choose an appropriate scene from the play – see below for assessment and assignments.

	Assignment 1: Suzuki Training Value: 15%
	Due Date: On going Description: An introduction to the physical and vocal exercises of Tadashi Suzuki. Students will move through the various routines developing strength, flexibility, balance and a physical relationship with their Ki energy, and its shared relationship with the observing audience. The nature of focus and concentration will also be explored drawing a formal nature to work in rehearsal and performance.
	Assignment 2: Woyzeck Scenes Value: 15%
	Due Date: TBD Description: Further investigation of realism in acting – connected to the plays of the naturalist era. Students are assigned partners and scenes to be presented in class.
	Assignment 3: Individual Monologues / Drafted Character Analysis Value: 20% - divided between the two components.
	Due Date: TBD
	Description: Students select and work 2-minute monologues of their choosing to present in class. Each student also provides a two - 3 page (500 - 750 word) written character analysis of their character's arc through the entire play – handed in as hard copy work.
	<u>Assignment 4:</u> Miss Julie Scenes Value: 15%
	Due Date: TBD Description: Students are assigned partners; each group then selects a scene from the play Miss Julie to be presented in class. Cross casting may be applied as well as alternate texts to accommodate an uneven gender split in the class.
	Assignment 5: Class journals Value: 10%
	Due Date: On going Description: As important as prep work like the character and script analysis it is vital that actors and artists catalogue their process through post reflection, also this journal
