Course description	In this foundational, practice-led class, we explore the fundamentals of directing.

Collaborative project	Assignment 1: Site-Responsive, Non-verbal, Collaborative storytelling project ("Colpro.") Description: Students will work collaboratively in groups to select a non-traditional performance site located near the classroom. During working sessions in class and two working sessions outside class time, together they will devise and rehearse a very brief story told without words, which will be presented in class. Paper, video, or audio presentation	Assignment 2: Observation/analysis of the use of physical score to help tell a story in a production. Description: You will select a theatrical performance either live or on Digital Theatre +, approved by instructor, and analyze the use of physical score to communicate the story in a 500-750 word paper. Alternatively, with instructor's permission, you may submit a prepared, structured 3 to 5 minute video or audio presentation.	Tues February 27, 2024	20%
Written document: Director's prep book	Assignment 3: Director's Prep book Description: You will provide written documentation of your directorial prep work on the scene you direct according to an outline provided by the instructor.	Tues March 26, 2024	20%
Project	Assignment 4: Directing a scene Description: You will direct and present one scene approximately 5 min long with two to three performers. Your cast will be assigned by the instructor, and will be classmates or other available students (TBC). Scheduled working sessions in class and two working sessions outside class time will lead to an in class scene presentation.	Thurs April 4, 2024 & Tues April 9, 2024	30%

Description: A director must exercise fluency in the fruitful exchange of artistic ideas with others, as well as model accountability, leadership, and collaboration. Assessment expectations

A good director demonstrates accountability, leadership, and respect for their collaborators' work and time. In this class, **students are expected to meet these standards.**

<u>Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:</u> Please submit assignments in soft copy only, to D2L, by 11:59pm on due date of assignment.

<u>Missed or Late Written Assignments:</u> A director is accountable for deadlines. Late written assignments, without prior permission, will be subject to a 10% per day penalty on the original grade they receive.

<u>Attendance and Participation Expectations:</u> The defining characteristic of theatre is presence. **Your presence in class is a major part of your learning** in this course and cannot properly be replicated in readings or at home. You are expected to come to class on time, having carefully read and considered the assigned readings and resources, and ready to work.

Certain classes are designated as working sessions and presentation days. Attendance is mandatory on all those days. See course schedule. Attendance is also mandatory for the four scheduled working sessions for assignments 1 and 4 outside class hours.

If, without notice or a valid explanation, you are absent or unworkably late to a working session during or outside class, you will automatically receive 0 on Assignment 6. If it happens a second time, during class or outside, you will lose 5% from your grade for Assignment 1 or 4 for that occasion and any subsequent ones, in addition to 0 in Assignment 6. If, without notice or a valid explanation you are absent or unworkably late on a presentation day for assignments 1 or 4, you will receive 0 on that assignment.
