Students will develop a one-pager for a screenplay idea, focusing on making the logline and synopsis both logical and compelling.

Students will write an initial draft of a one act play (using either screenplay or stage

play format).

Assignment 4: Screenplay/Play comparison

Value: 20% Due Date: June 5

Students will compare the screenplay and play script of either Scorched/Incendies or The Swearing Jar and discuss how the stories which were originally written for the

stage were adapted for film.

Assignment 5: Draft 2 (Final Draft)

Value: 20%

Due Date: June 15

After receiving feedback from peers using The Critical Response Process, students will

write a second and final draft of their play.

Assessment expectations

Expectations for Attendance and Participation:

All assignments need to be typed and double spaced with your full name and student number on the first page. All of the assignments are expected to be grammatically Correct and written using a proper essay format. Students are welcome to use APA or MLA to properly cite their work.

Your assignments must be submitted on D2L by 11pm of the due date.

Late Assignments:

A late assignment, or exam loses 5% per day for up to one week after the scheduled due date (including weekends). After seven days the assignment will receive an automatic zero.

Extensions:

Extensions are rarely granted. They are only given in exceptional circumstances such as family emergencies (and must be validated.) You may not receive and extension due to a failure to meet your workload. Extension will not be granted within five days of a due date.
