Course description	Interpretation of roles and special problems in performance: Drama 512 is the culmination of a series of advanced acting courses in Drama. Students engage in the integration and embodiment of creative and technical resources while acquiring methodologies for advanced research in performance practice. The focus on individual skill will be balanced by attention to collaborative practice. This course will be strongly orientated toward professional theatre. Scheduled rehearsals and performances are requirements for this course. Students will be cast in <i>Lights Out</i> , a devised performance piece, directed by the Director of the School of Creative and Performing Arts, Bruce Barton. Class meeting times will be used for research projects based on the production and coachings for the production, with the course instructor, to further dive into the work of an actor.
	The course will also focus on professional development and preparation for industry auditions, as well as general knowledge of the profession, such as how to work with an agent; other work like film and voice over; professional associations and other knowledge to support your career. Preparation for the Theatre Alberta Emerge auditions is a semester long project.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Display development of agency and integration of acting techniques at an advanced level both as individual artists and collaborating members of an ensemble. 2. Employ a range of research methodologies for the interpretation of texts that address character and the environment of the play to illuminate the acting process. 3. Demonstrate skillfulness in the application of body, breath, and other techniques that add to the fulfillment of the actor's craft 4. Master expectations for rehearsal, including interpretation of texts representing a range of styles and modes. 5. Practice strategies for reflection and self-assessment that support artistic practice. 6. Cultivate a personal and professional artistic identity through participation

	and engagement in discussion and practice of the disciplines and ethics require of an actor in the professional theatre.

<u>Unit 1</u> : Ensemble Performance	Students will be cast in <i>Lights Out,</i> part of the SCPA mainstage season. This play offers an opportunity to dive into a devised project, learning the process of creating a piece of theatre as an ensemble as well as engaging in specific physical practices and character study to tell the story.		
Unit 1 - Research component - written work	Students are to read two articles on devised theatre practice [links to the articles in Digital Theatre + to be found on D2L] and compare the two processes against what you are learning in this process for <i>Lights Out</i>	January 24th, 2024	10%
Unit 1 - Script breakdown and analysis - written work	Students are to demonstrate their process of developing their role in the production as well as documenting their contribution to the development of the play from first rehearsal through to production.	February 26th, 2024	20%
Unit 1 - Performance	Students will be graded on their focus, concentration and development of the character in the play. Students will be graded on their vocal and physical commitment to the storytelling and integrated application of acting principles, as learned throughout the acting classes	February 16th, 2024	20%
Unit 2 - Professional Theatre Practice	The focus of this unit is to prepare students for the showcase-style auditions for Theatre Alberta's Emerge Auditions that take place in the spring for students who have finished their acting training. You will be selecting appropriate audition materials and working to define who you are as a theatre artist to the respective panel of auditioners.		

Unit 2 - Emerge Audition Preparation - presentation - written work	Students are to select and prepare appropriate audition material for the Emerge Auditions in the spring. Students will select and prepare one 2-minute monologue and one 2-minute scene. Written work includes the student's process of preparing the material and applying all actor's processes to the pieces. Participation, Growth and Development	Students will demonstrate their understanding of the work required of a professional theatre practitioner through constructive participation, exercising their critical eye through individual investment in the processes covered, supporting the work of the ensemble and actively working to grow as an artist through diligence, application, risk, self -knowledge and benevolence towards fellow artists.	10%	on-going
