Assessment Components

Sketch Book: Discovering The Face (10%)

Students will explore facial expression, characterization, aging, facial shape, highlights and shadow through self-portraits and portraits of friends and family.

Class Assignments

Students will explore and execute different make-up styles and techniques, including basic make-up, fantasy, old age, prosthetics and clown, among others. Student will be required to photo-document all class assignments. Class assignments will be divided in to four units each worth 20% of their final grade.

Basic Make-up (20%)

This unit consists of four basic make-up techniques, Straight make-up, old age, facial hair and cuts and bruises.

Clown Make-up (20%)

Students will explore four different styles of make-up that fall under the classification of clown, Chinese Opera, Arcimboldo Faces, animal and clown

Prosthetics (20%)

This unit explores, face casting, mold making, sculpting creating and applying a prosthetic appliance.

Fantasy (20%)

Students will learn and apply different make-ups that exist in the realm of fantasy. This unit consists of, Francis Bacon faces, fantasy, black and white, day of the dead, Body Worlds and abstract.

Final Project (10%)

Students will be given the full two hours to execute an in class final utilizing the skills they have learned in the course. Student will be required to photo-document their process.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- 1) All assignments are mandatory and must be completed in order to receive a passing grade in the course.
- 2) No extensions will be granted on projects.
- 3) Assignments submitted after the deadline may be penalized with the loss of a third of a grade (eg. A- to B+) for each day late.

Assessment Expectations

Expectations for Attendance and Participation:

Due to the participatory nature of the class, grading for the course will be based on full attendance and participation
