Paper	Assignment 1: Annotated Bibliography (1) This is a continuation of the annotated bibliography assignment from DRAM 611. Students will compile and annotate between 15-30 references with bibliographic citations (MLA) and a concise summary of each source. Project incl paper	Assignment 2: The Height Project The source material for this project is at the student's discretion though the emphasis on this project is HEIGHT which is defined in this instance as something outside of the student's comfort zone or familiarity be that through text, form, or scale of performance. As per the other projects from 611, the assessment will be on the appropriate research, analysis, conceptual articulation, rehearsal reporting, Pass 1 (Feb 2), Pass 2 (Feb 9), and Pass 3 (February 16 th – Invited audience) as well as integration of limited scenographics.
