Course Description	The course this semester will focus on playwriting by women from the 1990s to the present, identifying key concerns and theatrical/dramaturgical strategies that distinguish their work, as well as critical perspectives that illuminate their plays. The course will combine lectures, discussion, student research presentations, and video excerpts.
