Description: Conducting two secondary choral pieces with the MUED 415 class. In class, you will be given a choice of choral pieces. You will be required to conduct using proper rhythmic patterns, dynamic and phrase shapings, entrance cues, and

articulation gestures.

Description: Prepare a score analysis and educational value synopsis for *An Die Musik* (Franz Schubert). You will be required to use this to create a lesson plan and teach this

piece to your MUED 415 colleagues.

### Assignment 4:

Value: 20%

Due Date: March 16, 2016

Type: Creation of Choral Rubric and Analysis of Secondary Choirs Assignment

Description: Develop a rubric and critique three choirs heard at Choralfest. Choralfest

runs March 1-5, 2016 at Knox United Church. A detailed program for this event will be available to you in mid-February.

### Assignment 5: Value: 10%

Due Date: TUESDAY, March 29, 2016 Type: Conducting Assignment

Description: Conduct University Chorus. You will have the opportunity to conduct a

piece in rehearsal with University Chorus.

Assignment 6: April 8, 2016

Value: 20%

Due Date: April 11, 2016 Type: Year Plan Assignment

Description: Develop a year plan for Choral Music 10 (SSA choir). You will be required to incorporate ten unison, SA, or SSA choral pieces of your own so start to collect those

early.
