Course description	The Pedagogy of Private Music Teaching is designed for music students of any instrument preparing for a career that includes teaching private music lessons to pre-college students. The course will examine various pedagogical methods, curriculum, and approaches to teaching in a private lesson. Topics covered will include learning styles, adaptive teaching methods, lesson planning, repertoire sequencing, approaches to technique, musicianship, aspects of studio business management (including marketing, scheduling, financial matters, and contracts), best practices for studio management and considerations in teaching children with special needs. The course will include selected readings with reflection questions, graded observations of your colleagues and community teachers, teaching demonstrations, activities and assignments, and self-reflection.
