	The University of Calgary Chamber Choir seeks to perform a broad range of repertoire,
	engage in collaborative projects, and develop partnerships with other artists and
	ensembles. This course normally meets for three hours per week during the Fall and
	Winter Terms.
	If the audition is unsuccessful, the responsibility for cancelling or changing the
	registration lies with the student.
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will:
outcomes	1. Engage and explore various vocal and choral music styles through a diverse mix of
	repertoire.
	2. Demonstrate enhanced listening skills within a small group setting, adjusting and
	adapting one's individual sound to ensure appropriate ensemble balance and blend.
	3. Appreciate the nuance and interpretation in any given piece of music related (but
	not limited to) tempo, rhythm, phrasing, dynamics, release, intonation, and emotion
	4. Recognize the importance of text in choral music, exploring how to enhance
	communication through careful vowel formation, consonants, proper diction, and
	emphasis.
	5. Demonstrate skill in body alignment, vocal musicianship, technique, and vocal
	artistry.

	thin neck scarf of any color. Men: Black suit or dress pants and jacket, dress shoes,
	white shirt, black socks, and tie.

Guidelines	Music) events free of charge.
	2. Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for
	CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for
	every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc.
	3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it
	is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the
	performance.
	4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box
	Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, students should
	find the UTS staff member with an IPad and show their UCID card to print their CYS
	ticket. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they
	can also go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students
	should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket.
	5. they can find a UTS staff member with an IPad and get their CYS ticket from them.
	6. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date,
	access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre
	Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early,
	up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time.
	7. Respect for the Front of House and theatre staff, performers and fellow patrons is
	an absolute requirement. Failure to comply with this will lead to being asked to
	leave the venue and could result in the revoking of CYS privileges.
