Assessment components	Students will be graded based on attendance in class and at performances. With plenty of advance notice of a performance absence, students will be required to meet the instructor regarding a replacement assignment. Typically, this is an essay on a topic of the instructors' choice. Should classes be shifted to online for any reason, attendance is still expected. The instructor reserves the right to assign course-based projects in lieu of inperson classes.
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Assessment expectations Grading scale	Attendance will be taken at every class event. As classes are considered equivalent to assignments, more than 3 absences per term may result in the grade of FAIL. In addition to attendance, active participate in class will also be assessed. Active participation includes engagement in the lessons and discussions, being on time, having music and pencil in hand, responding when called upon, staying for the entire length of the class, singing, and positively interacting with the instructor and peers. For performances, students are expected be prompt, at the required location, prepared with a black folder of music, staying for the duration of the performance, and in the appropriate dress attire. If course-based projects as assigned in lieu of in-person classes, assessment is based on completion of each assignment. Incomplete assignments are considered an "absence" from class. With less than 4 absences per term and 100% attendance at performances, students will

Guidelines for Zoom Sessions	Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a "live" video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community. To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with
	others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom,

including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.
