Course Overview	University Chorus is an opportunity for all university students to be involved in a choral	
	experience. Whether you are an experienced singer or this is your first experience,	
	choral music offers many gifts to those who become involved:	
	1. Choral music is a historical art form that reveals a glimpse of beauty that many	
	would not experience otherwise.	
	2. Choral music is a group activity. A choral performance is always more than the sum	
	of its parts: the individual becomes stronger through association with other voices and	
	other voice parts.

There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is 		
	expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance. 4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from 45 minutes prior to 15		
	minutes prior to the performance start time, they arrive to the CYS table next to the Box Office and show their Unicard. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket. 5. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access		
	 to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early, up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time. 6. Respect for the Front of House and theatre staff, performers and fellow patrons is an absolute requirement. Failure to comply with this will lead to being asked to leave the 		

	venue and could result in the revoking of CYS privileges.
