	1. Choral music is a historical art form that reveals a glimpse of beauty that many would
	not experience otherwise.
	2.Choral music is a group activity. A choral performance is always more than the sum
	of its parts: the individual becomes stronger through association with other voices and
	other voice parts.
	By the completion of this course, students should be able to:
	1. Sing a variety of sacred and secular choral works by composers such as Lassus,
	Beethoven, Mozart, Stanford, and many contemporary composers.
	2. Learn how to use their voices in a healthy manner, expanding their range, agility,
	and confidence.
	3. Learn how to listen to other singers, understand harmony, and develop their ear, as
	well as learn the basics of music reading.

	 Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is
	expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance.
	4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, students should find the UTS staff member with an IPad and show their UCID card to print their CYS ticket. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can also go to the Box Office and

	 purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket. 5. they can find a UTS staff member with an IPad and get their CYS ticket from them. 6. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early, up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time. 7. Respect for the Front of House and theatre staff, performers and fellow patrons is an absolute requirement. Failure to comply with this will lead to being asked to leave the venue and could result in the revoking of CYS privileges.
