Course Overview	The Jazz Orchestra is a big band that performs an array of big music from Benny Carter		
	and Count Basie to Maria Schneider and Alan Baylock. There is an emphasis on		
	improvisation and there will be opportunities to both study and perform improvised		
	solos. This year the focus will be on the music of Benny Carter, Gil Evans and Alan		
	Baylock.
