	Assignments (40%, due at the end of some classes and the beginning of others)
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	Assignments will consist of in-class dictations and activities that will be turned in at the end of individual class period and longer transcriptions and dictations that are to be completed outside of classroom hours and turned in the following class. All assignments must be prepared on manuscript paper according to the notational conventions outlined in the textbook. There is no fixed schedule for assignments; they will be done or assigned in class only, so if you are absent you will not be able to complete the assignment. Assignments must be legible. Late assignments will not be accepted.
	Dictation quizzes (25%, see schedule above)
	Dictation exams will involve notating rhythms and pitches from examples performed during the exam. It will require students to recognize and notate tonal patterns and longer melodies. Harmonic dictation and, eventually, multi-voice dictation will be required. There will be a section on error detection also.
	Recitations (25%, in the days following the dictation quizzes; see schedule above)
	Recitations will require students to prepare certain passages from the textbook to sing in moveable-do solfege and/or acceptable rhythmic syllables/counting . They will also require sight-singing from a selection of appropriate materials. Recitations happen individually with the instructor in 10-minute appointments scheduled prior to the posted recitation dates.
	Mastery
	Like learning an instrument, aural skills requires practice and involves correcting errors and trying again. Any dictation/recitation can be redone once in order to improve your grade. The time and location of the auxiliary dictation will be made available at the time that the dictation quizzes are returned, while recitations will be scheduled individually. Any improvement in your grade will be recorded as soon as possible.
