Course description	Detailed ethno-musicological examination of non-Western traditions. This course
	will survey the music of several of the world's cultures. Students will develop an
	understanding of musical structure, style, the differing cultures' aesthetic
	viewpoints, and the music's function and context within those diverse societies.
	Students will encounter new musical expressions as well as the corresponding
	world-views and philosophies that accompany them.
