	Funk is a musical style that emerged during the late 1960s and early '70s and is widely
Course description	considered as one of the primary influences in the development of disco, rap, hip hop,
	fusion, and contemporary urban and R&B styles. In addition, funk techniques have been
	incorporated into jazz, mainstream rock, techno, Afro-Cuban and Latin musics, a variety
	of Worldbeat traditions, TV soundtracks (i.e., the music for <i>Seinfeld</i> ), teen-pop, and even
	adult contemporary, Christian pop and gospel, and children's programming.
	But funk is more than just another musical language or genre. During the 1970s and '80s
	artists like George Clinton positioned funk as a communal religion, in which beat, rhythm,
	and message merged to provide a cosmic unity. Contemporary funk and rap musicians
	view the early history of the genre in almost Biblical terms, with artists like James Brown,
	Clinton, and Sly Stone assuming the role of funk lords and apostles.
	Seen in this light, the borrowing of quotes from their songs as samples in new hip-hop
	recordings can be seen as acts of homage and devotion by disciples who have heard The
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Word. As David Brackett writes in *The New Grove Dictionary of Music and Musicians*, "[Clinton] began to develop a cosmological narrative that proselytized the redemptive power of funk and has continued to influence numerous hip-hop musicians." Thus, as a musical language whose roots are found in the very same Afro-American styles that are at the basis of popular music—blues, R&B, gospel, and soul traditions—combined with its grandiose "theological" dimensions of influence, funk is deserving of serious study on both a global cultural level, as well as on the micro level of its musical techniques, artists, and songs themselves.

This course will follow the trajectory of funk from its roots in rhythm and blues through its classic formulation in the 1970s and will conclude with a discussion of the urban transformation and revival of funk over the last two decades. We will place funk within its cultural and social milieu, as well as examining the evolving musical characteristics of funk in some detail.

This course is intended for the general university student and neither assumes nor requires previous training in music.

# Course learning outcomes

By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- 1. Identify musical instruments of Funk by ear.
- 2. Recognize by ear the various song forms of Funk (12 bar blues, 12 bar blues with a bridge, A/B form, Vamp form, etc.).
- 3. Count choruses of the 12-bar blues.
- 4. Analyze and discuss the various musical procedures and techniques in songs of the genre.
- 5. Hear, recognize by ear, and be able to identify and discuss the main performers and approximately 70 of their songs in the history of Funk music.
- 6. Differentiate the various eras and musical developments in the history of Funk music.
- 7. Recognize influences of Blues, Gospel, Jazz, Rhythm and Blues, and Soul music on the development of Funk.
