	has no prerequisite, the material taught will be accessible to those students with

Course schedule	music.  This is an asynchronous course with no scheduled online meeting times. Instead, content in the form of recorded lecture, video, audio, etc. will be posted, linked-to or listed on D2L, which students will be able to access on their own time.
	This six-week course will be divided into <b>four quarters, or modules</b> (referred to as Module 1, Module 2, Module 3 and Module 4), each about a week and a half in length, and focusing on a different region of the world. Each module will culminate in an open-book <b>online quiz</b> on D2L.
	Each module will also conclude with the submission of a written assignment. A musical autobiography will be due at the end of Module 1, and an album review will be due at the end of Module 3. Students will also work on a listening journal throughout the semester, to be submitted in two parts: one at the end of Module 2 and again at the end of Module 4.
