Course Description	Further development of skills in rhythm, intonation and sight-singing. Performance of			
•	two-part contrapuntal exercises with chromatic modulation. Introduction to atonal			
	exercises.			
Course Overview	The course, together with theory courses, is designed to help the student musician			
	who intends to make music a career, by developing musical skills and an understanding			
	of how music is put together. While theory courses focus on developing written skills,			
	this course focuses on aural skills, and training of the ear. Students will acquire fluency			
	in the use of solfège, sing and notate melodies and chord progression, and develop			
	keyboard harmony skills.
