Course description	The study of opera during the Romantic period through a consideration of
	selected important works from the German, Italian, and French repertoires.
Course overview	This course is intended for the third- or fourth-year B.Mus. or B.A. Music Major
	student and graduate students. It will provide a survey of the major Romantic
	European opera composers and operatic repertory from about 1800 to about
	1900. Emphasis will be placed upon a listening knowledge of a representative
	sample of opera excerpts from this historical period. The classes will present a
	discussion of the major stylistic developments in opera in the context of an
	analysis of selections of different repertory works—all within the broader
	context of the history and culture of the period. A detailed syllabus of readings,
	listening assignments, and questions for in-class discussion will be provided.
	The course will be divided into three testing units (non-cumulative), with a test
	at the end of each unit. Each unit will also contain a short written analytical
	assignment.
Course learning	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:
outcomes	1. Have a good historical knowledge of European opera from 1800 to 1900
	2. Have a listening knowledge of selected important operas from the period
	studied.
	3. Have an understanding of the structural patterns, conventions, and forms of
	arias and ensembles.

	5. Have the ability to analyse and understand the conventions and traditions of
	Romantic opera.

Course schedule:	The course will be divided into three units. The first unit deals with the early phase of Romantic opera to about 1830. The second unit explores operas of Verdi during his middle period (1850-1870). The final unit deals with mid-century French opera (1850-1875) and Italian verismo (1890-1900).
Assessment components	There will be two tests, as well as a final examination scheduled by the registrar. Each of the tests and the final examination will test one of the three units of the course outlined above (non-cumulative). In addition to short answer and essay questions, there will be a requirement to identify and discuss specific musical selections drawn from the works studied. The tests may include an analytical component.
